Psychology services and Parkinson's

The psychology department based at the Royal Victoria Hospital has been developing a service for people with Parkinson's and their family. It covers all of Edinburgh.

People react to diagnoses and health conditions in different ways. The service is designed to help people adjust to having Parkinson's disease. Sometimes people develop depression or anxiety and cut down on their activities. Psychological intervention in conjunction with other members of the multidisciplinary team (and family if the person wishes) aims to help individuals learn different ways of coping and improve their quality of life. An anxiety pilot study is commencing in conjunction with the Parkinson's Nurse Specialists and will involve 40 patients with anxiety scored on the Hospital Anxiety and Depression Scale (HADS). The self management programme is about giving out a specially designed booklet for anxiety and a follow-up feedback session. The services are co-ordinated by Dr Elizabeth Baikie, Consultant Clinical Psychologist, and people are seen at the out-patient department, Royal Victoria Hospital.

We are excited by our joint venture with Marlene MacInnes, Psychology Trainee and we are looking forward to the pilot and evaluation. We hope it will be beneficial to people living with Parkinson's.

Feedback from the Community Psychiatric Nurses in East Lothian

Parkinson's Information session - Debbie Martin, Mental Health Liaison Nurse and team

"On the 14th April The East Lothian Community Team attended an information session delivered by Alison Stewart, Lead Parkinson's nurse .

"The session was well attended by all community staff working with older adults in the East Lothian area. We each had differing levels of knowledge, so the session began by Alison asking us to tell her what we knew and what we wanted to know. She then delivered a very accurately targeted talk delivering information on all aspects of Parkinson's; including signs, symptoms, treatments and strategies to support the person. This was delivered in a way which reflected our contact with the person at home and with their carer, allowing us to support the person and give information appropriate to the current evidenced approach.

"The session went on well past the planned time because the staff attending asked so many questions and were so motivated by the way the PD service has developed. So many of the ideas were innovative and things that we had thought about doing – the PD service had already done. Alison was so inspirational that we all left motivated to make changes to our practice.

"Within 24 hours three of the nurses who attended had experienced situations where the knowledge gained had in fact informed and improved their practice- nothing short of a miracle. Thank so much for the session and the inspiration, particularly at a time when so many shortages are having a negative effect on our morale, this was a real boost."

Advance Care Planning in NHS Lothian

The Advance Care Planning project is led by Jackie Whigham, Project Manager, and planned in partnership with the Marie Curie Hospice Edinburgh, St Columba's Hospice and NHS Lothian. The project aims to identify ways to help clinical staff to have an advance care planning discussion with patients identified in the palliative phase of their illness and then to ensure consistency in communicating the information to the wider healthcare team using recognised tools (electronic palliative care summary (ePCS) and do not attempt cardio pulmonary resuscitation form).

In addition to work within three clinical settings (long-term care, acute medicine and primary care), the project has also worked collaboratively with the Parkinson's Nurse Specialist service. This provided an opportunity to explore current practice and investigate how their patient group would benefit from advance care planning. The Parkinson's Nurses have a vital role in providing high quality compassionate care and are often ideally placed to have an evolving advance care planning discussion with their patients.

The team are now all Advance Care Planning Champions and have a greater understanding of the anticipatory care plan process within NHS Lothian. Dissemination of this information through the team will help ensure key information is shared with the wider healthcare team using the recognised communication tools.

Jackie Whigham, Project Lead, said "Advance care planning discussions with a patient provides the opportunity for them to make their wishes known and allows time to make the right choices for themselves and their families with respect to their future plan of care".
