Can voice algorithms spot Parkinson's?
Mathematician Max Little has come up with a non-invasive, cheap test which he hopes will offer a quick new way to identify Parkinsons's. Now he is looking for volunteers to contribute to a vast voice bank to help the database to learn even more. He is aiming to record up to 10,000 voices and has set up local numbers in 10 countries around the world. In the UK the number is 01865 521168. Anyone can call and they need to state whether or not they have been diagnosed with Parkinson's.

Single drug to treat range of brain diseases?
On May 6th, the BBC reported on the tantalising prospect of treating a range of brain diseases, such as Alzheimer's and Parkinson's, all with the same drug. This prospect has been raised by researchers at Leicester University. In a study, published in Nature, they prevented brain cells dying in mice with prion disease. Antihistamine drug shows promise
New research suggests that latrepirdine, a drug used in Russia as an antihistamine, may have exciting potential for treating <u>Parkinson's</u> . These early findings need further investigation but could ultimately lead to trials of latrepirdine in people with Parkinson's.
The study, published in the journal Molecular Psychiatry last week, was carried out by a team at Mount Sinai School of Medicine in New York.The study suggests that latrepiridine can reduce levels of alpha-synuclein – a protein thought to be involved in nerve cell death in Parkinson's.
