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BIOGRAPHY



K Ray Chaudhuri is Professor in Neurology/ Movement Disorders and Consultant Neurologist at Kings College and the Institute of Psychiatry, London Academic Health Sciences Centre. He is also principal investigator at the MRC Centre for Neurodegeneration Research at Kings College, London and medical director of the National Parkinson Foundation International Centre of Excellence at Kings College, London.

Professor Chaudhuri is the author of 215 papers including reviews, book chapters, co-editor of 4 books on Parkinson's disease and Restless Legs Syndrome and over 200 published peer reviewed abstracts. His major research interests are continuous drug delivery treatment of PD and restless legs syndrome, Parkisonism in minority ethnic groups and sleep problems in PD. In 2005 he was awarded the DSc degree by the University of London.

NON-MOTOR SYMPTOMS OF PARKINSON'S: IMPORTANT YET OFTEN NEGLECTED. WHY?

Non-motor symptoms (NMS) of Parkinson's affect every patient and carer, occur before the onset of "motor" Parkinson's and progress as the condition develops. Yet it is the least researched, funded, or understood group of symptoms and poses the greatest challenge to clinicians and health care professionals.

Professor K Ray Chaudhuri and his international non-motor group have pioneered clinical research in NMS in Parkinson's and in this talk he will review and explore major new developments in Parkinson's research with particular reference to:

- The key effect of the range of NMS on quality of life of people with Parkinson's and their carers.
- New knowledge on treatment of various NMS of Parkinson's such as fatigue, pain, sleep disorders, depression, apathy and dribbling of saliva.
- A new way of "staging" Parkinson's in the clinic using NMS, moving away from the old-fashioned systems.
- New scales and questionnaire for assessing NMS in the clinic.
