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Message from Our Chairman – John Minhinick

On the 3rd May our Fife Branch Committee will be holding its next bi-monthly meeting. A very important item on the agenda is planning the return to '**in-person'** meetings in line with changes to the Scottish Government regulations.

From the programme that came to an abrupt end in early 2020, we hope to get the **Walking Group** programme going again in the second half of June. Michael Bruce – R.N.L.I Anstruther



Michael is the Fulltime Coxswain/Mechanic at the Anstruther R.N.L.I Lifeboat Station and was our Guest Speaker at one of our Monday GetTogethers.

Michael held us enthralled as he took us through a potted history of the R.N.L.I and the boats that had

been in service over the years. He then focussed on the history of the Anstruther Station and Crews and the remit they now have. We were then introduced to the proposed new lifeboat and the replacement Lifeboat Shed which is required to house the bigger boat.



The images of the shed looked amazing on the architect's plans. As well as the essential spaces for the crew to work, train and get together there will also be a gift shop, which will be manned (and womaned) by Mary and the merry band of Anstruther R.N.L.I Volunteers.

Michael also told us about his own interesting journey through his life from his attendance at Cellardyke Primary School to his present post as Fulltime Coxswain/Mechanic at Anstruther.

Finally, Michael gave us a visual tour of the R.N.L.I College in Poole where he and his volunteers have to go to for training, sometimes several times a year. This centre provides a state-of-the-art facility and even has a pool that can take a full-sized lifeboat and can simulate different lighting conditions to put the crews through their paces.

This facility provides an ideal base to meet the demands of the charity today and in the future.

The session was supposed to finish at midday, but if I report that Michael was still answering questions at 12.30, you will realise how fascinating Michael's presentation was.

Thank you, Michael, for sharing your most interesting and entertaining story with us. We look forward to visiting you in your new home in the near future.

SLIDESHOW OF FAMILY TRIP TO BRITTANY REMINISCING WITH ROMA JEFFERSON

Our trip today was a summary of a very entertaining family holiday with the Jefferson's who travelled from Scotland to France – motoring through England on the first stage to Plymouth to catch the overnight ferry to land at Roscoff. It was a rough crossing, and they didn't sleep much during the journey. Luckily the campsite was close to Roscoff and therefore not too far to travel before getting a good rest.

Roma led us through the coastal areas in north Brittany showing various photos of the spectacular range of rock formations which are unique. A lot of time was spent visiting the countryside and the small villages – with lots of beautiful sandy beaches which were ideal for families with children.



Of course, the use of the French language was a major feature of the holiday and many times it was a struggle to get their message over to the locals. Because of the rapport between the Scots and the French, the welcome was fantastic. Their knowledge of the French language was well used and many hilarious episodes of "getting the wrong words" became features.

The holiday was based in Perros Quirec at a campsite right beside the pink granite coastal path. This path was built in 1791 as the customs officer's route checking for illegal activity. In 1968 it was developed into the coastal path.

They visited many places along this coast including Ploumanach, a former fishing village, where there is a shrine to St Quirec on the beach. St Quirec was a Welsh monk who wanted to establish a monastery in this part of France. In 2015 it was voted Village most preferred by the French.



Tregastel is a lovely town although there were sandbags in place! Particularly unusual was the underground swimming pool on the seafront. This was a memorable holiday which Roma thoroughly recommended to all.

Camera Club News – Bob Copeland - Friday 31st March

At our meeting today seven members attended, and we had prepared a before and after Photograph which had been post edited and each member showed their photograph the original and discussed the steps they had taken to alter their photograph. We had a range of photographs and saw the steps each took to post edit their photographs showing the enhancements to the photographs.

The object of the post editing is of course to make the photographs better using the tools available in the editing suite. Some use Lightroom which is by Adobe who also have Adobe Photoshop in its armoury and is probably the best known and used by serious amateurs and professional photographers. For the rest of us there are free editing suites we can use to post edit our photos to a decent standard such as Snapseed, the editing programme in your phone or computer. You can also download others.

At our next meeting we plan to give our original photographs to other members in advance to post edit, no pressure then.

14th April

We had decided at our last meeting that we would all submit a photograph that we had taken. The other members would edit the original and show their interpretation of the photos. It was most interesting to see the way other photographers edited someone else's photos. As there is no emotional tie to each photograph, it can be edited to their own style and preferences.



Each person used an editing suite or app that they normally use. The ones used were Lightroom, Adobe Photoshop and Snapseed, each fine in their own way depending on the enthusiasm of the photographer and whether it was for a club competition or just to make the photographs better for your own satisfaction.

The editing suite Snapseed app is free and is pretty good for most modest changes but has its limitations. Lightroom is an editing tool made for photographers by Adobe and has much more to put at the disposal for the photographer. So much more can be done to the photograph in a dramatic or a nuanced way. Lightroom and Adobe Photoshop

are editing tools available by monthly subscription only. There is also another one called Affinity at half the price and reputedly just as good or you can use the one on your phone which will be good enough for most of us. If you have an interest in photography, come along to our informal Zoom meetings and join our group.

It was a good idea to have this discussion and any further suggestions would be most welcome. When planning the walks consideration is given to finding walks suitable for wheelchairs etc. and other individual needs.

The first walk has been provisionally booked for Friday 16th June at Dunfermline Pittencrieff Park, from 10.30 am, so we look forward to meeting you then.

Diane Dunbar's **Crunchy Top Lemon Cake**

Ingredients for Cake

4oz soft margarine 2 eggs 4 tbsp milk

6oz self-raising flour

6oz caster sugar

finely grated rind of 1 lemon

Ingredients for the Crunchy Topping

4oz caster sugar

Juice of 1 lemon

1tsp baking powder

Method

Heat oven to 180 c/ 350 f / gas 4 Grease and line the base of 7 in, deep round tin. Put all the ingredients in a large bowl Beat well for 2 minutes until smooth. Put the mixture into the prepared tin. Bake for about 35-40 minutes until the cake has shrunk from the sides of the tin or springs back when lightly pressed with a finger.

Make the crunchy topping

Measure the lemon juice and sugar into a bowl stir until blended When cake comes out of the oven spread the lemon paste over the top whilst the cake is still hot Leave to cool in the tin until cold then remove from tin.
